## HUMAN RIGHTS DOCUMENTS

### *Annual Supplement*

IDC Publishers aims at annually updating its collection of Human Rights Documents. This year (2008), materials from 2006 have been added to the publication. All materials originate from non-governmental human rights organizations (NGO's) and are published in close cooperation with the Human Rights Internet (HRI). HRI prepares the materials for filming and catalogs the materials in order for researchers to be able to easily retrieve the documents they need.

### *About Human Rights Internet*

HRI describes itself on the internet as follows:

Founded in 1976, HRI is a leader in the exchange of information within the worldwide human rights community. Launched in the United States, HRI has its headquarters in Ottawa, Canada. From Ottawa, HRI communicates by phone, fax, mail and the internet with more than 5,000 organizations and individuals around the world working for the advancement of human rights. Our Mission Statement reads as follows:

**HRI is dedicated to the empowerment of human rights activists and organizations, and to the education of governmental and intergovernmental agencies and officials and other actors in the public and private sphere, on human rights issues and the role of civil society.**

HRI's extensive web site at <http://www.hri.ca/welcome.aspx> offers information on a broad range of human rights topics. Although HRI embraces the internet as a means of simplifying searches for information and resources on human rights events and issues, its name did not initially refer to the internet as we know it today. Rather, the term indicates an "*international network* of human rights organizations".

### *Broad Geographical and Subject Coverage*

The materials included in this and all previous Human Rights Documents publications cover a wide range of subjects and geographical areas. The documents cover such diverse topics as women's rights, children's rights, the right to freedom of expression and assembly, torture, politically motivated killings and imprisonment, "disappearances", slavery, genocide, misuse of the judicial system (unfair trials) etc. The collection has been organized according to geographical area: Africa, Asia and the Pacific, Middle East, Latin America, North America, Europe. Documents published by NGO's with a global orientation are listed under the section General.

### *Related Projects*

IDC annually updates its publication of the Amnesty International archive. The collection contains Amnesty's dossiers on individual countries dating back to 1975 and Amnesty's publications dating back as far as 1962. The documents are organized by geographical area. The supplement containing the 2007 materials is due to be published in November 2008.
